



- Calls from SAC through the wing command posts
- "Bring everything on alert and leave it there"
- Intel briefings finally on Sunday

Monday - 22 October 1962

President Kennedy addresses Nation

 SAC and most of US military to Defcon 3

 US forces in Europe at higher alert but no Defcon change

- B-47s disperse to commercial airports and bases in US and overseas with nukes on board
- B-52 airborne alert increased to 65 aircraft in the air
- Recce flights to Cuba and Soviet
 Union increased




Wednesday – 24 October

 Notification by voice directly from Gen Thomas Power, the CinCSAC, instead of a coded message

Friday – 26 October

 A-06 attains alert, followed by the other nine missiles in the flight





The Crisis is Slowly Defused

 Extensive negotiations and discussions at many levels

Many missteps along the way

Soviets respond to the quarantine

 Kennedy and Krushchev agree on a solution

A Slow Return to Normal

- Force maintained at Defcon 2/3 until
 20 November
- But We aren't released from 24 hour manning until the Monday following Thanksgiving, the following week.
- SAC now back to "normal."
